



Fr. John died four years ago, but his presence is still among you, through the work of BaSE, the organization that Fr. John built to allow you to sell the beautiful products made with your own hands.

Fr. John understood how important it was for the poor women in Bangladesh to discover and support, in their families and in society, their dignity as humans through their handicraft work; this is why he created BaSE.

When Fr. John suddenly died in October 5, 2009, Lidia, Nica, Marianna, my brothers, myself and all your friends that have been selling your goods for many years decided to not let this project stop, but to let it live as a sign of Fr. John's presence among you.

For this reason, despite the economic crisis, we continued to visit you, we asked the experts (Rossana and Bettina) to come to Bangladesh to help you in your work and to develop new items, we gave you funds to buy machinery and equipment, we funded the new warehouse in Maniktola, and, above all, we continue sending orders, even if at this time it is not easy to sell your products in western countries.

But nothing is useful if you do not understand that you need to stay together, to cooperate with each other and with BaSE's staff, and, first of all, to act according to the inspiration of Father John; he dedicated all his life to helping the poorest and weakest people, in the same way you have to make sure that BaSE focuses its activities in helping needy people. You should think about BaSE's interest before your own direct interest; only in this way can Fr. John's dream continues and he will continue help poor people through BaSE.

We are committed to supporting you, but our commitment will not help if you do not stay together for the interest of all and especially for those most in need.

BaSE Mission, Vision and Principles....

In the Beginning....

BaSE was founded by an Italian Xaverian missionary, Fr. Giovanni Abbiati, known as Fr. John.

He observed the poverty and life of the poor villagers, especially the underprivileged women. He wanted to change the situation but without providing direct financial support so as to avoid economic dependency.

Knowing that village women use jute to craft their household decorative items, he decided to give them the opportunity to uphold their traditional skills and prepare these products for the market. For this purpose he started a specific group in Bhoberpara village and began to export these goods, devoting his life to the development of the livelihood of the poor disadvantaged handicraft producers.

BaSE concept was born in 1977 and was officially formed in 1999 to co-ordinate the handicraft activities of various producer groups working in the South-West part of Bangladesh. United in BaSE, these groups which were out of the main stream got the chance to promote their products.

BaSE stands for Bangladesh Shilpo Ekota, which means United Artisans of Bangladesh.

Brief in BaSE

BaSE is a non-profit Fairtrade organisation of Bangladesh set up to co-ordinate and promote the handicraft products of various female manufacturing groups out of the mainstream, especially those working in the South-West.

United in BaSE, these groups produce various types of handmade items, such as Palm Leaf Basketry, Jute Macramé, Nakshi Embroidery, Women's Clothing and Accessories. Totalling over 10,000 producers (99% are women) organised in 18 producer groups and having over 3,000 products, BaSE producer groups have excellent capacity & skills to prepare custommade products also according to buyer/partner requirements.

Since 1999 BaSE is member of the World Fair Trade Organization (WFTO).

Vision Statements

We envision economically self-sufficient, socially recognised, culturally-empowered and morally-aware, dignified women in Bangladesh.

Mission Statements

BaSE's mission is to allow the women of Bangladesh themselves to weave their dignity, self-consciousness and self-sufficiency with their own hands and craftsmanship, inspired by their traditions and handicraft legacy.

Values & Ethical Guidelines

Without discrimination of gender, colour, caste and creed, the society is completely charitable, beneficial, educational, non-political, non-communal and non-profitable. It intends to be a non-discriminating society with regard to nation, colour, creed and gender.

Current Social Objectives

We focus on producer development through work opportunities, education and health support for the families, capacity building of human resources.

Details of Goals & Objectives

In order to pursue its endeavour, BaSE identifies three (3) Broad Operational Objectives, together with more specific Concrete Operational Objectives:

I. To promote, encourage and assist the constitution of handicraft producers into economically viable Fair Producer Groups (hereafter FPGs):

- a. Coordinating FPGs activities, promoting thrift, self-help and democratic practices.
- b. Enhancing the skills of handicraft producers through the organization of workshops, capacity-building training seminars and education-related classes.
- c. Providing new-design, new-material, new-technique and sample-development trainings and facilities by coordinating with other institutions, agencies and organizations both at home and abroad in the interest of BaSE and its handicraft producers.
- d. Supporting FPGs by granting Advance Payments to purchase the raw materials needed for production.
- e. Supporting FPGs in the selection, purchasing strategy and logistics of raw materials and equipment.

II. To establish valuable, trustful and durable relationships with international Fair Trading Buyers (hereafter FTBs) all over the world:

- a. Constantly searching for new market opportunities for handicrafts.
- b. Interpreting the ever-moving market trends.
- c. Developing, together with FPGs, effective answers to the changing market demands and needs.
- d. Fulfilling FTBs' requests and desires, especially striving for the excellence of its services such as by ensuring prompt, requests-matching delivery, reliable, transparent and fair prices, supreme product quality and innovativeness.
- e. Promoting and ensuring the respect of the WFTO's Fair Trade Standards (World Fair Trade Organization) by all BaSE's FPGs.
- f. Participating in national and international fairs, workshops and seminars on handicraft and Fair Trade.

III. To animate welfare activities and projects for producers, such as housing, educational, recreational and health-care facilities for better-living conditions:

- a. Establishing charitable and development funds for the well-being of poor artisans irrespective of caste, creed and race.
- b. Preventing early marriages of artisans' daughters.
- c. Ensuring that artisans' children reach a basic minimum level of education.
- d. Scanning and identifying young meritorious students among handicraft producers' daughters and sons.
- e. Distributing warm clothes among the elderly poor people during winter season. Increasing literacy rate by arranging adult education.
- f. Encouraging the adoption and maintenance of Saving Funds within the FPGs.

BaSE Producer Groups

BaSE consists of different types of members - Direct Groups, Associates Groups and Occasional. The specifications are:

- i) Direct Groups: The groups receive direct support in legal issues; follow the fair-trade principles, production management, packaging and shipments. The direct groups are Bhoberpara Pat Kutirshilpo (BH), Banchte Shekha Handicrafts (BSH), Ekota Mohila Shomity (EMS), Bonochaya (BC), Muzgunni (MUZ), Khalishpur (KHC), Baniarchor (BA), Baradal (BLH), Shelabunia (SHE).
- ii) Associate Groups: These groups have own management structures and reflect in them a commitment to justice, fair employment, public accountability, progressive working practices, equal gender balance and abolition of child labour. The associates groups are Valerian Handicrafts (SH), Rishilpi Handicrafts (SAT), Blue Sisters (BLU), Charka Handicrafts (CH), DPDE, Hand Touch (HT), Jagoroni (JAG), Women Training Center (CHA), YWCA.
- iii) Occasional Groups/Members: This category provides export facilities to mutual organisations. The occasional groups are Alex; Bonpara PIME Sisters (BAM); Arshi-Salesian (SS) etc.

BaSE producer groups have over 3,000 own design products and have excellent capacity & skill to prepare custom-made products according to buyer/partners requirements.

At present BaSE is working in the following areas as follows:

- * Division: BaSE is working in 2 Divisions in Bangladesh Khulna and Dhaka.
- * District: BaSE covers 7 districts Khulna, Jessore, Meherpur, Satkhira, Faridpur, Bagerhat
- * Villages: BaSE producers are located in over hundred villages in 7 districts of 2 divisions.
- * Producers: In total, about 10,007 producers are working under 18 producer groups (Direct and Associates).
- * The producer numbers increase/decrease according to the annual production volume.

Base and Fair Trade Principles

Creating Opportunities for Economically Disadvantaged Producers

All BaSE producers are from economically disadvantaged positions and remote areas of the country. Ninety-nine percent of producers are women and as with most societies in the world today, women in Bangladesh face huge discrimination in all aspects of life. BaSE's main idea is to provide working opportunities for women, especially marginalised producer groups, in order to improve their socio-economic status.

Transparency and Accountability

Every unit has an elected representative who keeps account of the production and savings of the members of the unit. The body formed by the unit representatives is the decision-making body of the producers' group. This body elects among the representatives a person as Chairman, one as Secretary, one as accountant. In addition, this body chooses the persons in charge of Quality Control.

Each group follow their own system to maintain the transparency and accountability. BaSE's management team regularly follows-up the groups to ensure transparency and accountability.

Fair Trading Practices

BaSE evaluates the orders and plans the production, preparing a tentative schedule of the shipments. Any producers' group can place in the twice-yearly meeting agenda a point of discussion, as BaSE itself utilises the same meetings to clarify any problematic issues.

BaSE create Advance Payment fund to provide 50% advance payment to the producers groups against the production work order.

Payment of a Fair Price

BaSE groups maintain a fair wages policy. We are ensuring minimum 10tk per-hour working wages. Each producer maintains wages books to keep record of payments. Every single producer group has to prepare and evaluate the pricing of its items. BaSE follows and checks this process, although the criteria vary from group to group.

Ensuring no Child Labour nor Forced Labour

In BaSE, child labour or forced labour does not exist. Our producers work mainly at home, besides taking care of family works; sometimes the producers' children help mothers. However, this is just a way to help in the family and to contribute for their schooling expenses.

Commitment to Non-Discrimination, Gender Equity and Freedom of Association

In BaSE women and men have equal advantages and enjoy the same rights. Producers are free to quit and organise on their own. We have many examples of producers who trained & worked in BaSE and later started to work independently.

Ensuring Good Working Conditions

Most of BaSE producers work at home. Beside household activities they produce the item. With joy and enthusiasm, BaSE producers regularly visit the centre to collect and submit the work order.

Providing Capacity Building

BaSE regularly conducts training and workshops in deferent issues such as Information Technology, Sample Development, Production Management, Quality Control, Product Costing, Accounts & Financial aspects etc.

Promoting Fair Trade

Through works BaSE promotes Fair Trade to the various levels of people in Bangladesh. BaSE producers raise awareness of Fair Trade in their community too.

Respect for the Environment

BaSE producers use natural and local raw materials. The raw materials are recyclable and biodegradable. 100% environment friendly.

As well as the production and activities during the year BaSE takes many other initiatives. You can see the story of its progress in the photos;

BaSE House

BaSE has been working since 1977 and we haven't any facilities of our own to store the goods. Until the present day BaSE used 4 different places as a warehouse, some places without paying rent and some places with rent.

In the places we faced many difficulties to keep the goods properly. Finally, BaSE now has its own place to run the activities. Now we can keep the goods properly before the shipment. The total space of the Warehouse about 2,700sq.ft. Last 22 January 2013 in the presence of the Bishop Khulna Dioceas, BaSE Executive Committee Members, Advisors, Associazione Solidarietà Terzo Mondo representatives, Producers, Well-wishers, inaugurated the BaSE House.

















Ms. Teja's Visit



100 Embroidered Histories Project

With the Rossana Vittani initiative and Sondrio friends' cooperation we conducted "100 Embroidered Histories" Project. The project aim is to raise funds through selling Embroidered Table Runners. Over 100 ethnic minority community children from Fr. Luigi Paggi, Fr. Rento Rosso and Banchte Shekha Fisherman Village project participated in drawing their life histories in paper & crayons. Now BaSE producers are converting the drawings into Embroidery. We hope for the best outcome from these initiatives.





Design Development Workshop

From 29th to 8th April 2013, we conducted the Design Development workshop with BANCHTE SHEKHA HANDICRAFTS and CHARKA HANDICRAFTS. The workshop was conducted by Ms. Emanuela Leombruni and Ms. Carolina Manclossi from Milan, Italy. Mainly Home Décor and Accessories item have been developed, in total 31 new concept products.

The recycle Shari and Cement Bags idea especially is very interesting. Our producers and leaders put their 100% effort into the sample development process and for that reason in such a short time many samples have been made. Even in Hartals (Political Strikes) they were active. We express our thanks to Emanuela and Leombruni for their excellent cooperation. Big thanks to Rossana for her idea and technical support. Our producers are very much looking forward to work opportunities with these new samples.



BaSE of base

Bhoberpara (BH) Group is one of the first group of BaSE and during the year had an exceptional opportunity to manufacture one of their carpet items. Fr. Benjamin Gomez, Noluakuri Mission ordered carpets for the Church. Big thanks to Marianna and Elena for introducing us to Fr. Benjamin.

BH producers were very moved and happy to get this working opportunity. After completing the item, 5-producer member team visited the Mymensingh to fit the carpet accordingly. As usual for Jute Producers, BaSE provided subsidies in this order to reduce the price.

The five-member producer team visited the mission for delivery and fitting the carpet. The distance from Meherpur (Mujibnagar) to Mymensingh is about 500km. and take about 10-12 hours. The team stayed there 6 days to complete the fitting.

Fr. Benjamin was highly pleased to see the carpet and he assured to convince other Parishes to provide us more work opportunities. The girls were also very happy to visit there; it was like a 'picnic' trip for them. BaSE bears all the transportation and logistic costs of this programme.







Producer Development Stories

We have many success stories to tell.

In this report we described the success stories of the producer children. Among the various stories you will find some stories of producer's family members, who, through the work with BaSE who struggle to achieve dignity, prosperity and empowerment in their lives. BaSE is changing lives and some stories are for you....

Blue Sisters

BLU



Sahina Begums life story is full of tragedy. She beards a lot of pain in her life. She is working in Blue sisters group from 35 years. She got married at the age of fifteen. Her husband, Sobhan Sorder was a van puller. However, he was not satisfied with his income and he was a lazy man that is why he always tortured her for dowry. However, her father was unable to help because his economical condition was also not so good. So most of the time they spent their day hand to mouth. She has four daughters. Like another uneducated people, her

husband also expected a son from his wife. He also bit Sahina for their four daughters. In addition, one day her husband left away and got married with another woman. Then Sahina went her father's house with her four daughters. She joined Blue sisters group and learnt jute works from them. She bought a piece of land from her income and made a little home for her family. Now she is living happily with her daughters. Her economical conditions were not so good that time that is why she was unable to give

her first two daughter's education facilities. She gave them married. However, her younger two daughters were reading in school. Her daughter Samia Afroz reads in class nine in Rupsha Bohumukhi School and another one read in class eight in Khan- E- Sobur mohila madrasa, Now Sahina wants to give her daughters higher education.

I can do anything for my son- Momotaz told us that. Momotaz, 38 years old, is now living happily with her husband.

However, 23 years ago her position was not like that. Her father's family lived in poverty so it was impossible to run her family very well. She read till class five at local primary school. For this reason, she involved herself in work from her childhood. At the age of fifteen, she married a day labourer. Her husband Rofiq Moholdar was not a hard worker, so her married life was not peaceful. He beat her often for money. She felt helpless and one day she went to BaSE to get an opportunity. Then she learned the jute work and joined the Bhoberpara group.

With the help of BaSE she learned that work properly. Slowly she developed her position through this work. She maintained her family with her income. After some time she saved some money and then her husband told her to buy him a rickshaw-van, to contribute family income. She bought a van for husband.

Her husband now works properly for his son's future. Now she has only one son, named Shofiqul. He is a H.S.C (Higher Secondary Certificate) candidate and he wants to be an important officer.

In her family this son is the first person to reach this level of education. Momotaz saved money through work for her son's education.

She wants her son's dreams to come true. Now her husband's income is used to maintain the family and she spends her money on her son's education. She is changing her entire family through her work....



Banchte Shekha Handicrafts

All my dreams have come true thanks to BaSE...When we asked about her life, Kulsum told us.

Kulsum is one of the oldest members of BSH Group. She learns needlework from her mother. After her marriage, when she saw the condition of her family and husband she joined the BSH group. She has three daughters and one son. Her husband is a day labourer and a lazy man. However, Kulsum manages her family by adding to her husband's income. Her married life was not peaceful because of her three daughters. Her husband and his family expected a son.

She told them girls can do everything like boys and she proved that. She wanted to educate her children and she has done it.

Now, her elder daughter, Shila reads Kamil (Masters). The next one, Pya, reads B.Com. And her younger daughter, Kamrunnahar is in class seven. Her younger son also is in class seven. Beyond her husband's income she bears the family expenses and children's education through her income. She shows that girls can do...



Baniarchor

Meri Baroi is one of the oldest producers of BaSE. She lives in Baniarchor, village. This group mainly produces jute items. She is a skilled producer because she can develop new samples properly.

She learned this work 34 years ago. She joined the Baniarchor group in 1984.

She bare so much pain in her life. Her husband's name is Sochindronath Baroi. She has three daughters and two sons. She works hard and earns money to continue her children's studies.

Her husband was a fisherman. Her husband's low income was not sufficient to manage her family properly and it was quite impossible to run her children's education well.

Therefore, at night she harvested other peoples' land and in the day, she worked for BaSE. Because her husband was, sick that time and cannot work at all.

Now, her eldest two daughters are married and youngest daughter is studying in Masters in Dhaka.






